## CORONATION DAY MEMORIES

Having recently celebrated the 60<sup>th</sup> Diamond Jubilee [great party by the way Tina!] it set me thinking about the Queen's Coronation, in 1953. I was only 7 years old at the time and my only previous recollection of Kings and Queens before that, was on a cold february day in 1952, when our infant school teacher told us to stand in silence with our heads bowed, because our King had died.

Like everyone else I enjoyed the excitement of preparing for the young Queen Elizabeth's Coronation. For my birthday in March I'd been given a replica of the famous Golden coronation coach and white horses, by one of my aunties, and I could hardly wait to see the real thing!

We children were promised a street party, with lots of good things to eat, and as sweets were still rationed at that time, this was a really big deal!

My Mum sat up late with the sewing –machine, using scraps of red,white & blue material to make bunting to stretch from our house to the one opposite.[Tricky negotiations needed with the rather frosty neighbour who lived there!]

Finally the day dawned, June 2<sup>nd</sup> 1953 – and it rained! Hasty re-organisations took place, no street party, but thank goodness we had the church hall just down the road. So all was not lost

All the grown-ups in our street were invited, in relays, to witness some part of the ceremony on the one TV set the street possessed, owned by upwardly mobile Mr. & Mrs. Walker. Fading and flickering black & white pictures on a 13 inch screen, but an historical event, - the first ever live broadcast of a coronation.

The children had to make do with listening to the ceremony on the radio, until we got bored with the hushed reverential tones of the commentators, and went off to play!

A few weeks later however the colour and pageantry was played to us in glorious technicolour, when our school took all of us to see it at the local cinema. Besides being dazzled by the ceremony, I thought how young the queen looked, and wondered how she managed to walk about with the weight of that heavy crown on her head.

But my main concern was pity for the young soldiers who fainted in the heat, and wondering how on earth they managed to stand to attention for 8 hours or more, without needing to go to the loo!
